DEPARTMENT HAPPENINGS

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ARTS

As we reach the finish line of this unique year, our elementary classes will be completing the first year with our Benchmark resource. They have worked on reader's and writers workshop model. Our teachers have demonstrated their skills and flexibility as we moved from a virtual to a hybrid and an in class model of teaching. Our Instructional coaches have been valuable supports as we implemented Benchmark. We also thank our AIS Reading teachers for supporting our students throughout the year.

SCIENCE

Assessments

Our 4th and 8th grade students took the State Science assessments on June 7th. This year the state only required the written portion of the exam. Next year we move back to adding the performance assessments back in. As we implement the New Science Standards, the new Science Assessments will be in 2024 when the new elementary assessment moves to Grade 5 and the grade 8 students will take the new intermediate level assessment.

The Living Environment Regents will be administered on Tuesday, June 22. The Earth Science Regents will be administered on Thursday, June 24th.

The Science Research students have prepared a virtual Science Symposium, which will be shared on the district website soon. We congratulate our seniors who have each created a video presentation of their research. It is wonderful to see and hear the high level skills that these students have developed. The underclassmen will be listed with the titles and topics of their research. We are very proud of the work our students have done this year despite the many obstacles. We also want to thank their teachers: Frank Tamweber, Stephanie Massey, Kyle Baldus, and Rhona Castellano who have helped guide these students throughout the year. We will also be welcoming 34 new students to the program as they join the program as freshmen in September. We look forward to a very positive and exciting year for all of our research students.



CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

In the middle school: Computer Applications students have been learning about the world of tech bit by bit! Students did a fantastic job at working through Digital Citizenship and exploring how technology relates to their lives. As the school year comes to a close, 6th and 7th graders are continuing to build their skills in coding! Students have chosen their own coding projects and are working in Scratch. 

Social Studies Happenings

As the school year winds down, Social Studies classes are busier than ever. AP classes (Human Geography, Macroeconomics, Psychology, US History, and World History) completed final preparations for their digital exams and students successfully tested during the first 2 weeks of June. Social Studies classes are now wrapping up content, focusing on skills and preparing for 4th quarter assessments.

Before our seniors graduate, many are receiving financial literacy lessons in their economics classes. Through project based learning, students are gaining important knowledge about budgeting and living on their own (jobs, apartments, utilities, groceries, etc). They are also learning about credit (student loans, car loans, credit cards, etc.). Students in AP Macroeconomics classes are learning about investing through their participation in a stock market simulation.






"Cell Block Tango," from Chicago: High School Edition

STEAM

We are moving FULL STEAM AHEAD! STEAM Team members have already participated in two of three training sessions from the Boston Museum of Science and will be finishing up with our last session on June 23rd. The last session had everyone building a tower with index cards and just like our students, everyone continued working even when time was up! This summer we will start developing the STEAM Program by integrating a Design Thinking and PBL approach into all the quality work that is already happening in the district across grade levels and content areas.

As summer approaches lots of Elementary artists are creating with bright colors, exploring the works of Georgia O'Keeffe, drawing outside and even creating nature prints. Students at Lincoln Titus are working on their annual school wide perseverance project. This year's topic is mosaics. Each student is making their own mosaic out of paper as well as contributing to a collaborative glass mosaic. The Fifth Graders at Thomas Jefferson Elementary just completed the "T.J Strong" rainbow tree. T.J. Third graders are creating Agamographs about the butterfly life cycle while kindergarteners are making clay ladybugs.

6th and 7th grade artists analyzed the painting "Juneteenth" by Edward Santana White.

Students searched for hidden symbols and words and discovered how they related to the theme of his painting. Then middle school artists chose their own theme and created a painting using washable markers and watercolor paint.

As we wrap up the end of the school year, each class is a flurry of activity as students paint, color, draw, write and continue to think creatively and critically.








LHS Drawing Class final project was all about radial symmetry and themes. Showcased all the skills they learned this year.



They filled in suspect boards, character profiles, answered short answer questions, and engaged in many class discussions to try to guess who the killer was. It was a great experience for the students as they showed an interest in developing a love of reading!

Elementary:

K-2 students have enjoyed the unit on Folktales from around the world. This month we highlighted variations of *Little Red Riding Hood, Jack and the Beanstalk and The Little Red Hen. Children also enjoyed a Caldecott Celebration. They learned about this prestigious award and heard Caldecott winning stories. There were many lively conversations about illustrator styles.*

As we end this school year, students in grades 3 - 5 were introduced to several fun and offbeat stories. They enjoyed the wordplay in the stories by Roald Dahl and Sid Fleischman; and were captivated and engrossed with the short stories by Vivian Vande Velde. Also, African folk tales were a big hit, especially Anansi stories. Everyone loves a trickster! At last count, *Abiyoyo sung/told by Pete Seeger was by far the favorite!*

GUIDANCE

As we are nearing the end of the school year, the high school counselors have been finalizing post high school plans with the seniors. Surveys, the national deposit deadline for colleges, vocational programs, and connecting students to employment opportunities are just some of the ongoing end of year follow-up.

10th grade and 6th grade students are now on Naviance! The 10th and 6th grade students are the newest groups that are now up and running with their Naviance accounts. With access to this program, they will begin to learn about how they can conduct college and career research as part of their goal setting!

Lakeland High School now has a Breathing Room! A repurposed computer lab is now a space where people can relax, regroup and refocus during the day with the goal of alleviating stress and improving one's mindset. Mrs. Scharff, high school counselor, spearheaded the project by way of the generous support given by the Lakeland Education Foundation's grant. All of the Lakeland counselors, social workers, school psychologists and student assistance counselor have been integral in making the Breathing Room's opening a success. A special thank you to the ACE students in Engineering class for their help in assembling all of the furniture!

At Copper Beech, the middle school counselors are all in with transition work. The 8th grade counselors are meeting with the high schools and the elementary schools as well as 6th and 7th grade counselors preparing students for their upcoming years such as counselor-led tours of the 7th grade area for 6th grade students.







Health Highlight:

Ms. Barone's eighth grade students have been learning about the dangers of substance abuse. Students created vision boards to look at how their future could be impacted by substance abuse. They are now learning about communicable diseases. Seventh graders finished their alcohol unit where they discussed decision making and the dangers of alcohol use and are now learning about nutrition and will be setting goals in order to improve their eating habits. Elementary PE Highlight:

George Washington Scooter City is up and running! The students have been so excited to finish off the year with one of their favorite units. Scooter City is a citizenship and community based unit where students earn money through their fitness efforts. With that money they are able to play fun activities such as arcade basketball, Just Dance, air hockey, ping pong, rope swing, and so much more! Students also earn money by working certain jobs that are needed to keep our city running smoothly. During this unit they learn the importance of hard work, community, budgeting money, cooperation and many other values that will carry them through life! HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION

At **Benjamin Franklin**, they have recently finished up an outdoor challenge course unit with students in grades 3-5. The challenge course is a series of stations that tests a student's balance, flexibility, coordination and muscular strength. Students travel through the course using various obstacles such as rope and tire swings, as well as a balance beam. All students participating in the unit gained valuable experience collaborating in groups using skills such as communication, teamwork, cooperation, support, safety and respect.

K-2 students have recently completed an obstacle course unit. This is a new unit for the students at Benjamin Franklin. Coach Auerbach and Coach Janik wanted to expose their students to the challenges posed by an obstacle course since this will be one of the stations they complete during their upcoming Field Day. The K-2 obstacle course featured many athletic and fitness related challenges such as an agility ladder, hurdles, a balance beam, a mat wall, a balance board walk and an army crawl.







In Lakeland Copper Beech Middle School (Gym A), they just completed a three week unit in Recreational or Back Yard Games. Students participated in four different activities over the first two weeks which included Can Jam, Bocce, Cornhole and Ultimate Frisbee. Each class rotated once through each activity for four PE classes. During the last two classes of the unit, students were given the choice of which game they wanted to play during PE, allowing them to pick the game they liked most to play with their friends/ classmates. The final week of the Rec Games unit was a four day capture the flag competition. These games were typically played class versus class to see which PE class could gain the most points in a period.

The **Walter Panas High School** Physical Education program now offers archery! Students had a great time challenging themselves while trying something new and exciting. We would like to thank the Lakeland Education Foundation for helping us make this new unit possible!



ENL

The ENL Department completed NYSESLAT testing for grades K-12 on June 9, getting all but one remote student in for all three in-person testing sessions. Kudos to the ENL team and building administrators for their flexibility in scheduling and room accomodations. And thank you to our ENL parents for getting their students to the testing sessions. A true team effort! The testing sessions were critical since last year's NYSESLAT was cancelled due to COVID, preventing students from showing their progress in the four modalities of English--speaking, listening, reading, and writing--and keeping them at their 2019 levels of service this school year.





The ENL team is also thrilled to offer in-person summer school for 20 of our neediest ENL students. The three-week program focuses on the four language modalities, with a combination of both social and academic English. The program is funded by our state Title III grant and is designed to help our ELLs maintain their language progress over the summer and prepare them for the upcoming school year.
