Anthem by Ayn Rand

In a future world, only one man dares to think, strive, and love as an individual in the midst of a paralyzing collective society.

Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini

The Kite Runner follows the story of Amir, the privileged son of a wealthy businessman in Kabul, and Hassan, the son of Amir's father's servant. As children in the relatively stable Afghanistan of the early 1970s, the boys are inseparable. They spend idyllic days running kites and telling stories of mystical places and powerful warriors until an unspeakable event changes forever the nature of their relationship and eventually cements their bond in ways neither boy could have ever predicted.

Jane Eyre by Charlotte Bronte

This classic novel follows the extraordinary and triumphant story of a young girl who grew up an orphan to ultimately find independence and a chance at true love. But a dark secret threatens her chance at future happiness.

***The Writing Life* by Annie Dillard**

Dillard is a disciple of Thoreau's and wrote her own autobiographical account of time away from the modern world, *Pilgrim at Tinker Creek*, in the 1970s. Originally published in 1990, Dillard's collection of essays on being a writer is like having a conversation with someone who has lived through all the joys, the tragedies, and the passion that make one become a writer. Full of fascinating details and insights this small gem provides illuminating insight into the mind of a writer.

***Their Eyes Were Watching God* by Zora Neale Hurston**

An African-American woman searches for a fulfilling relationship through two loveless marriages and finally finds it in the person of Tea Cake, an itinerant laborer and gambler.

***Native Son* by Richard Wright**

Trapped in the poverty-stricken ghetto of Chicago's South Side, a young African-American man finds release only in acts of violence.

***Frankenstein* by Mary Shelley**

Victor Frankenstein has discovered the secret of generating life from lifeless matter, and has created a monster using this terrible power
