Mr. Poloni,

It is my honor to present the Grosse Pointe Shores Department of Public Safety 2024 Annual Report. The Annual Report is the official record of activities, events, and training related to the law enforcement, fire, and emergency medical services for the year. As this annual report presents a record of occurrences and achievements, it also presents shortfalls and problems yet to be resolved. As such, it creates a database to assist in planning and provides a means by which realistic goals and levels of service may be established for future years. The members of the Public Safety Department have and will remain dedicated to maintaining a safe community for our residents and visitors through proactive law enforcement, aggressive fire suppression, and superior medical services.

The Grosse Pointe Shores Department of Public Safety when fully staffed has 17 public safety officers. At the start of the year in January 2024, there were 14 sworn public safety officers. In December 2024, Grosse Pointe Shores hired another officer for a total of 15 public safety officers. Hiring triple trained officers has been difficult due to a national shortage of first responder candidates. The public safety department is committed to searching for and hiring the most qualified and professional officers that will compliment their current staff.

The addition to the public safety staff was on December 14, 2024. Public Safety Officer Devon Dentai was sworn in after graduating from the Macomb Public Safety Institute Police Academy. Prior to his employment in Grosse Pointe Shores, PSO Dentai was a student at Macomb Community College where he entered their paramedic program and graduated with a degree in Applied Science. After graduation, PSO Dentai began to work for MedStar Private Ambulance Company. During his time at MedStar, PSO Dentai received valuable EMS training and experience. According to MedStar, their company responds to 190,000 EMS calls annually. PSO Devon applied to Grosse Pointe Shores because he wanted a career where the community and public safety department work together.

In 2024, the Public Safety Department responded to 2636 calls for service, a 1% decrease from 2023 where the total was 2749 call for service. In Grosse Pointe Shores most calls for service result in relatively minor occurrences where the public safety department provides some guidance to resolve the issue. Calls for service that require direct police action are categorized as Part I, and Part II Crimes. The following report is the numbers Grosse Pointe



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Shores reported for 2024. These Part I and Part II classifications are classified by the FBI, and reported to the FBI, as required by law.

The police division in 2024 seen an 1.3% decrease in Part I crimes from 2023. There were 6 reported Part I Crimes in 2024, compared to 8 reported in 2023. In 2024, the Auto Theft category reported 4 losses. Part II Crimes seen a 1.1% increase in 2024 compared to 2023. Identity Theft increased by 1.2% with 12 reported incidents.

The EMS Division responded to 128 calls for service in 2024. 67% of these responses were for cardiac or medical priority one calls for service. 28% are classified as Trauma related. EMS calls were down 1% from 2023.

The Fire Division recorded an 87% increase in activity from 2023. The reason for this large increase is due to the restructure of the Fire Mutual Aid Running Card. Mutual Aid Running Cards are designed so when one Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods community receives a fire-related call for service, an additional Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods municipality, in geographical location to the requested address, automatically respond to the requested location. Now, 2024 the Grosse Pointe's and Harper Woods fire departments restructured the Running Cards so that two additional Grosse Pointe/Harper Woods municipalities respond, which will provide the proper, State required fire response that includes equipment and manpower. 182 total responses for 2024 compared to 82 responses in 2023.

The **2024 Directors Award** is presented to Public Safety Lieutenant / Deputy Fire Chief Ron Coste. Lieutenant / Deputy Fire Chief Coste is being recognized for "consistently exceeding the everyday expectations." The presentation of this award to Lieutenant / Deputy Fire Chief Coste is not for any one incident or project that he supervised in 2024. Instead, Lieutenant / Deputy Fire Chief is receiving this award because of his 25-year commitment to our core motto, "*Customer Service.*"

In 1992 Lt. Coste received his EMS License and began his medic career working for American Medical Response. That was 32 years ago. Today, Lt. Coste is the Senior Lieutenant In-Charge of Platoons 1 and 3. He holds the title of Deputy Fire Chief where he oversees the fire operations that include training, vehicle and equipment maintenance and purchasing. Additionally, he is the department's Training Officer. His

responsibilities include designing the yearly training curriculum and for every officer. Each officer has a standard number of required credit hours of training that are deemed mandatory by the State and Federal government. Lt. Coste keeps the department compliant. On top of designing the training curriculum, Lt. Coste is the Lead Trainer. For the past 12 years Lt. Coste



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has mentored our officers either during their tour-of-duty, after critical events, or in the classroom on training days. He educates, instructs, and teaches our staff how to be efficient by utilizing their skills and minds. Most importantly, Lt. Coste leads by example. Always emphasizing “Customer Service” to our younger staff.

Over Lt. Coste’s 25 years he has received the Life Saving Award twice, 5 Unit Commendations, 1 Certificate of Merit, and a previous Director Award in 2019. Lt. Coste has attended the Michigan State University prestigious School of Train the Trainer. Lt. Coste holds certificates in Fire Officer 1, 2, and 3. Arson Investigations, Building Material and Combustibles, Evidence Tech, Firearms Instructor, Grant-Writing, Motor Officer, and several Advanced Supervision and Leadership Classes.

There is an old saying that goes, “you don’t know what you got until it is gone.” In 2024, Lt. Coste took a leave of absence that was required by his doctor to address a health issue. During Lt. Coste’s absence, it was obvious that our leader was missing. There was even a moment where “we” were not sure if he would return. During that time Lt. Coste called me every day, concerned about the schedule, training orders, and equipment orders. In essence, he worried about everything and everybody here in GP Shores. As stated in the Directors Awards definition, “performs at a level not bound by what is expected, but what is required for the efficient operation of the department.” The whole time he was off resting, he was thinking of GP Shores and our operations.

Lieutenant Ron Coste deserves this award because of his professional contributions to this department over his past 25 years. Most importantly, Lt. Coste deserves this award because of his dedication to the men and women he serves with, and the community he serves.

Lieutenant Ron Coste is an asset to the Grosse Pointe Shores Public Safety Department as he has performed his duties in an exemplary manner. It is my privilege to award the 2024 Directors Award to Lieutenant / Deputy Fire Chief, Ron Coste.

There are two additional awards for 2024. First, a **Department Citation** awarded to Public Safety Officer Dillon Taylor and Public Safety Officer Billy Howe. Department Citation is to be awarded to a police officer for outstanding performance of a difficult task involving personal risk to the officer’s safety when, because of the officer’s action, a serious crime is prevented or the perpetrator or apprehended, or other outstanding actions of a nature which brings unusual credit to the department and its members.

On August 20, 2024, at 10:24 pm PSO Taylor and PSO Howe initiated a traffic stop on a Chrysler 300 at Lake Shore and Whitcomb. During the stop, the driver was advised to exit the



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vehicle because the vehicle had no insurance, expired registration, and the driver was suspended with several misdemeanor traffic warrants. As PSO Taylor asked the driver to exit the vehicle, the driver fled the scene with PSO Taylor and PSO Howe in pursuit. The vehicle preceded south on Lake Shore driving over lawns and sidewalks to avoid apprehension. The driver made an error and turned onto Newberry Street in GP Farms, which is a “dead-end” street. PSO Taylor and Howe were able to “box-in” their vehicle and conducted a Felony Stop ordering the driver and occupant out of the vehicle. This scenario ends with the driver and occupant placed under arrest and charged with Felony Flee and Elude.

What is significant in this event is that these two officers, Taylor and Howe, have been with the public safety department for only 3 years. This was a critical incident that where seniority and experience are valuable, and these two officers conducted themselves as “seasoned veterans” during this stressful event. They relied upon their training, followed the department Policies and Procedures and demonstrated good “common sense,” and their ability to perform in this critical situation.

Public Safety Officer’s Taylor and Howe are to be commended for their professionalism during this critical event. PSO Taylor and Howe are assets to this department and this community. It is because of this event as well as their everyday efforts that they are to be awarded the Department Citation.

The second award is a **Citation of Merit**, and that award is presented to Public Safety Sergeant, Jason Cook. The Certificate of Merit is to be awarded to a police officer for outstanding performance on duty under unusual or difficult conditions. The actions need not involve exposure to physical danger, but must involve unusual thoroughness, contentiousness, determination and initiative.

Referring to report 24-2211, a resident on Willow Tree requested an ambulance for her elderly husband who was as she described, “was in an alter mental status, and verbally unresponsive.” Because Medic 4 was “Out-of-Service,” mutual aid was requested and GP Shores back-up, MedStar, was ordered. Sergeant Cook responded to the home to initiate patient care prior to MedStar’s arrival. Once on scene, Sergeant Cook immediately realized the patient was in critical condition. Sergeant Cook requested dispatch to advise MedStar that this patient is now classified as a Priority One call for service. As Sergeant Cook continued to monitor the patient, Sergeant Cook witnessed the patient collapse and went into Cardiac Arrest. As Sergeant Cook began CPR, MedStar arrived on scene. Sergeant Cook took the role of Lead Medic and directed the patients’ care with the assistance of MedStar’s medics. As Sergeant Cook and the MedStar medics provided Advance Life Support, they were able to



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quickly stabilize the patient and transport him to St. John's Hospital were our resident made a full recovery. Our resident was provided excellent "Customer Service" by Sergeant Cook. That service started with Sergeant Cooks responding to the scene within minutes of it being dispatched. It continues with his 20 years of EMS experience and finishes with supervisory skills to take charge of the scene and his ability to rely upon his training and perform in critical moments.

Sergeant Jason Cook is to be commended for his professionalism during this critical incident. Sergeant Cook is an asset to this community and department, and because of his actions he is to be awarded the Certificate of Merit.

Congratulations to the four Public Safety Officers who received awards in 2024. Your efforts prove to the department and community that you are all assets and leaders in the Public Safety Department.

The Investigations Bureau is lead by Detective / Lieutenant Tony Spina and he is assisted by Detective / Sergeant Ryan Wilson. The investigation and prosecution of criminals is their responsibility. Detective / Lieutenant Spina, and Detective / Sergeant Wilson attention to details, along with their dedication, accounts for the high clearance rate in the detective bureau. In 2024, Sergeant Wilson participated in two additional In-Service Training classes that benefit the detective bureau. He attended Digital Phone and Cellular Investigations. This class was 24 hours of instruction taught by Federal Government investigators and prosecutors. A few topics included mobile phone search warrants, social media posts, and recovering deleted data, The second, The Reid School of Interrogations. This three-day class enhances the officer's interview and interrogation skills. Over 500,000 law enforcement personals have attended this 3-day class. Lieutenant Spina graduated from the prestigious Staff and Command School presented by Northwestern University. Over 21,000 law enforcement officials nationally have completed these 240 hours of college-classed course material. Topics of discussion include Leadership, Statistics, and Budgeting.

The fire department is overseen by Deputy Fire Chief Ron Coste. In 2024 Deputy Chief Coste hosted a Practical Fire Training Day at 824 Lake Shore Road. The property at 824 Lake Shore was scheduled to be demolished and the owner, Matt Cullen granted the Fire Department permission to utilize the property for fire ground exercises before the demolition date. Fire fighters rotated through four workstations that include search and rescue, fire suppression, ventilation, and ladder operations. Additionally in 2024, Sergeant Jason Cook attended Fire Officer II School of Command. Because Sergeant Cook has already completed the prerequisite class, Fire Officer I, these two certifications allow Sergeant Cook to design and



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teach State mandated fire and EMS training class to our staff, which will keep us compliant with the required State mandates.

The EMS Division is supervised by Sergeant Jason Cook. In 2024 Sergeant Cook's big project was designing, outfitting, and ordering a new ambulance for the Grosse Pointe Shores Department of Public Safety. Sergeant Cook worked with MacQueen Fire Services and developed the "new" Medic 4. After a presentation to the City Council, approval was granted, and Sergeant Cook ordered a new 2024 Ford F-450 Braun Chief XL. The delivery date for this new ambulance is December 2025. Other EMS accomplishments include the re-certification of the department's 3 Instructor Coordinators. This re-certification is valid for three years. The Instructor Coordinators are licensed to provide the required monthly State training for the department's 13 paramedics. Recertification is for good for three years; however, the process is continuous as beings all over again every three years. Additionally, Sergeant Cook reinstated the public safety departments EMS education program with St. Johns Hospital, Detroit. Our paramedics are pre-scheduled to attend clinical skills training in the emergency room. This training provides our staff the opportunity to improve their EMS skills as they work alongside the ER doctors and staff at St. Johns. This relationship with St. Johns hospital is very valuable to our EMS operation. The public safety department wants to thank councilmen Dr. Donn Schroder for assisting Sergeant Cook with initiating this program.

The police department continued to provide Advanced In-Service police training to our officers throughout 2024. Officers must qualify annually to carry a Taser. In January this mandatory Taser training is hosted by Sergeant Bojaj and PSO Roybal. Officers will complete a classroom and practical test before being certified for the year to carry this weapon. In April, PSO Howe attended Basic SWAT School Training in Alpena, Michigan. This training course is a week-long, with more than 40 hours of hands-on instruction. Students participate in various tactical exercises designed for local responses to critical events in the Grosse Pointes and Harper Woods communities. In December, officers utilized Blue Steel training facility in Port Huron, Michigan. This facility is unique because it is law enforcement-based training that incorporates live ammo in its scenarios. This training is as close to real life as it gets, and that is extremely valuable to our officers. In March the police department collaborated with the Wayne County Prosecutors Office to write and approve two new policies and procedures. The first, Warrantless Searches, and the second, Extreme Risk Protection Orders. The police department replaced an aging scout with a new Ford Explorer. All 4 scout cars upgraded their In-Car computer workstations with the purchase of Dell Latitude 5450 Rugged Workbooks. In May, a conditional offer of employment was given to candidate Devon Dentai, PSO Dentai



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graduated from the police academy on December 13th and sworn-in as a public safety officer on December 14<sup>th</sup>.

In conclusion, I want to thank the Mayor, Council, and residents of the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores for their continued support of the men and women who serve in the public safety department. That support has allowed us to maintain our professional standards and commitment to our core value of "Customer Service." To the members of the Public Safety Department, who time and time again have proven their dedication and professionalism throughout 2024 I would like to say, "Thank You!" Grosse Pointe Shores continues to be one of the greatest cities in Michigan due in part to your professional efforts.

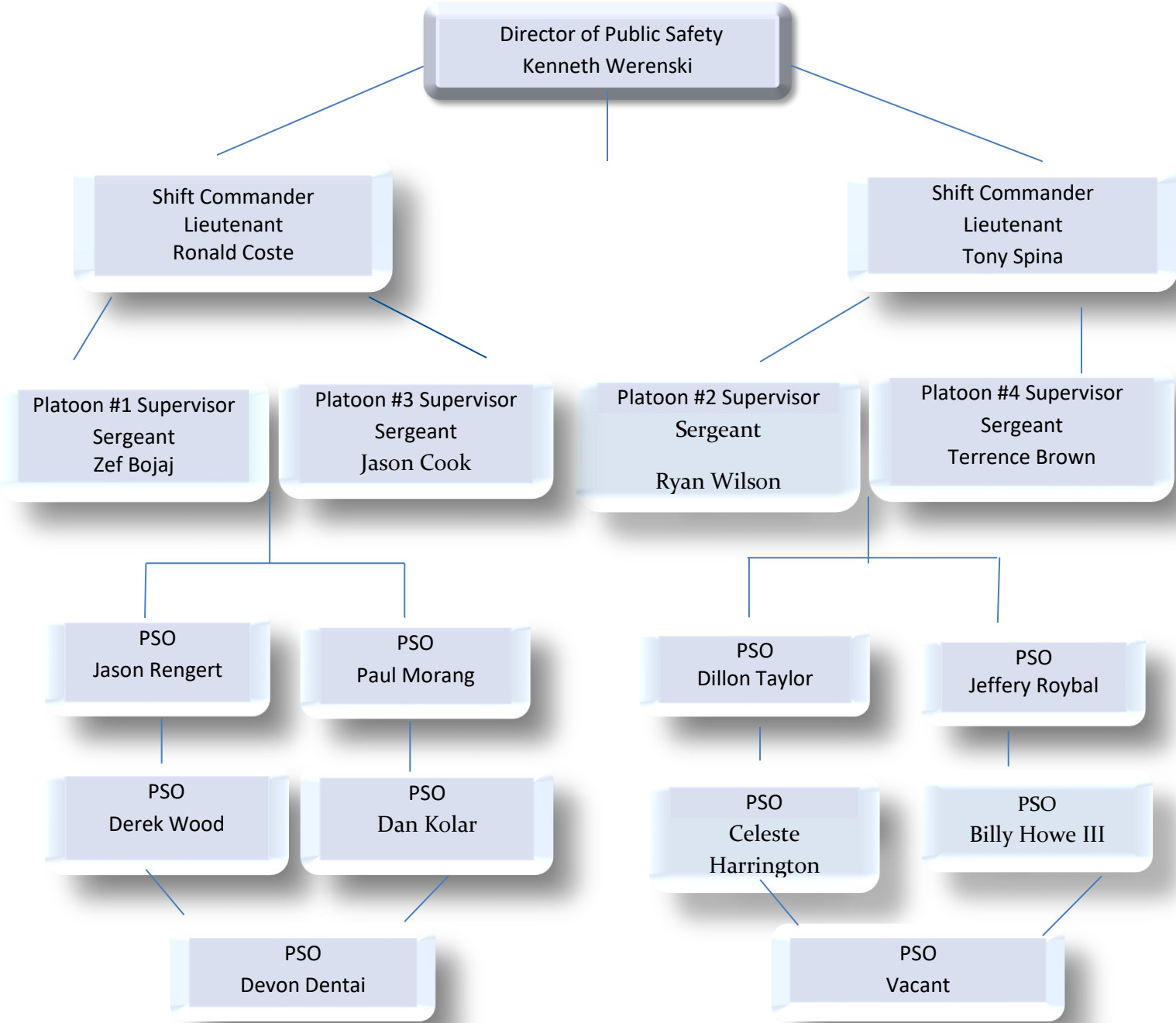

### **DEPARTMENTAL AWARDS**

#### **LIFESAVING**

#### **UNIT COMMENDATION**

Unit commendations are awarded to a group of officers that perform outstanding service while working as a team to achieve a common goal or outcome.

#### **MERIT**

Merit awards are earned for outstanding performance of duty under difficult situations or conditions. Merit awards can be achieved for dedication and diligence over time in the everyday performance of duty.

#### **DIRECTOR'S AWARD**

The Director's Award is awarded to the public safety officer that consistently exceeds the expectations of the job description and performs at a level not bound by what is expected, but what is required for the efficient operation of the department.

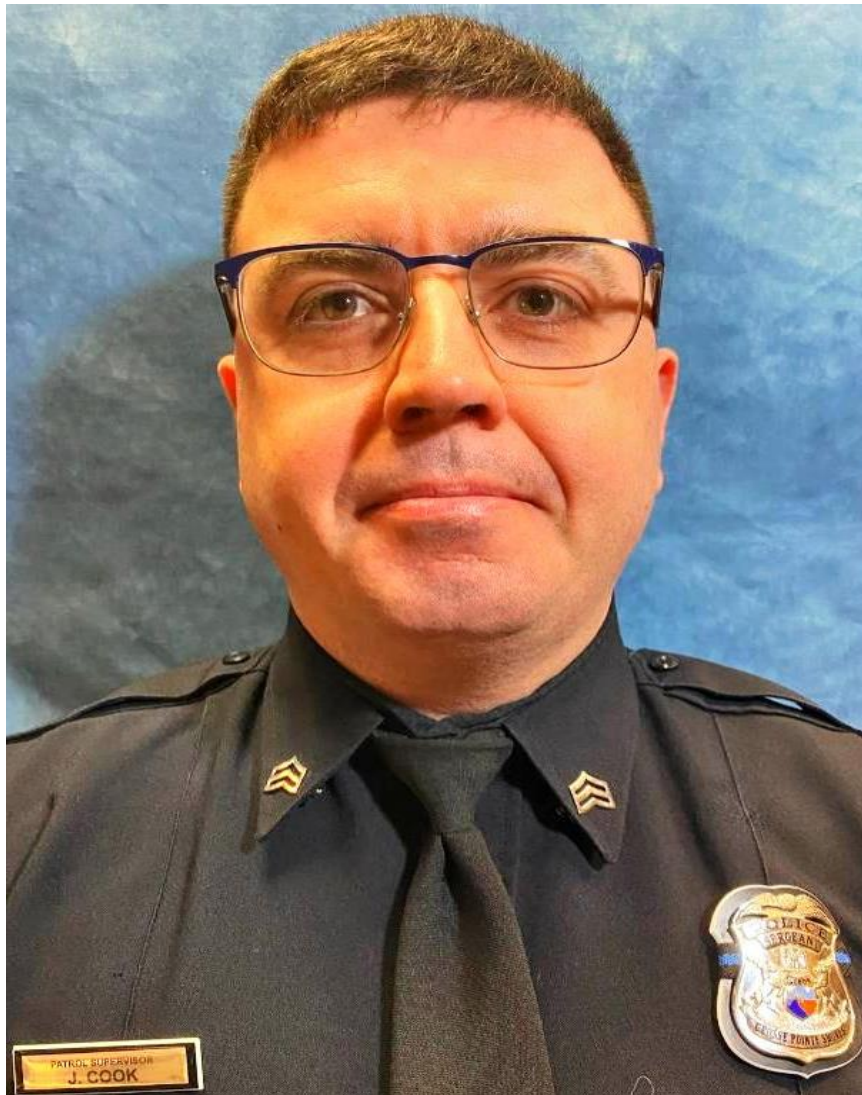

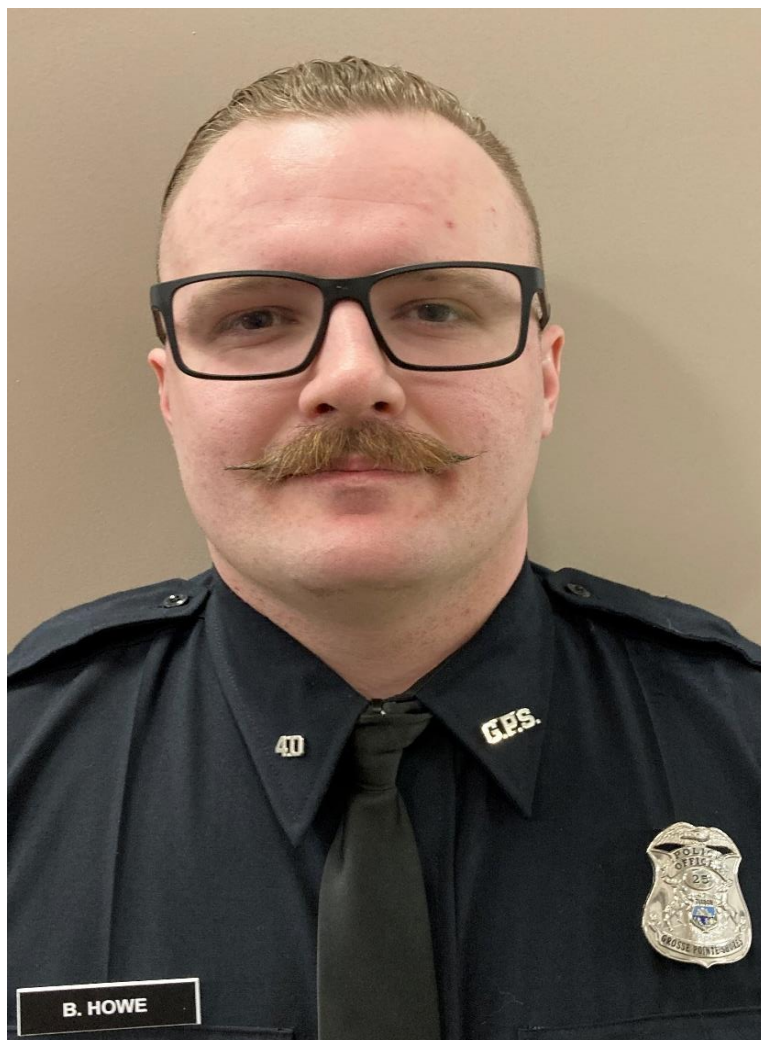

### POLICE DIVISION



#### Personnel Overview

As of December 31, 2024, the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores employed 15 sworn officers and 4 civilian administrative part-time clerks. The Grosse Pointe Shores Public Safety Department was the first in the nation, comprised of entirely triple trained officers: certified and or licensed to provide police, fire, and paramedic services. At full strength, the department employs 17 public safety officers and requires a minimum of 13 licensed paramedics for adequate staffing.

The Mission of the Grosse Pointe Shores Public Safety Department is to uphold the highest level of emergency services while remaining professional, courteous, and transparent in our operations. The men and women who serve the Village promise to deliver dedicated customer service with integrity and fairness to all who live, work, or visit the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores, a Michigan City.

#### Uniform Division

To maintain uninterrupted 24-hour service to the community the department operates under a 4-platoon system. Each of the 4 platoons consists of shift supervisors and public safety officers. Two Lieutenants are assigned as shift commanders and each Lieutenant manages 2 platoons. The shift commanders are direct reports to the Director of Public Safety. The 4 platoons work 12-hour shifts and rotate every 10 weeks from days to nights. The patrol shifts are responsible for the protection of citizens and their property by enforcing State and Local Laws and local City Ordinances. Routinely, the patrol officers respond to citizen calls for assistance, enforce traffic

codes, conduct field investigations, and assist with any special programs or activities occurring within the community. The patrol division is the core of our organization and is responsible for

the personal and professional relationships that exist between the department and the citizens of our city. In 2024 patrol responded to 2636 calls for service, a 1% decrease from 2023. During the response to these 2636 Calls for Service, our public safety officers have become “close” to our residents often being on a first name basis with them. The public safety officers will tell you that this is why Grosse Pointe Shores is a special place to serve.

### **Detective Bureau & Special Operations**

The Detective Bureau and Special Operations responsibilities are assigned to Detective Lieutenant Tony Spina and Sergeant Ryan Wilson, who together oversees case investigations and the prosecution of criminal and youth offenders. The department relies upon the Detective Bureau to conduct criminal and internal investigations, hold witness/subject interviews, and perform surveillance details. A detective’s responsibility is to function as the Officer-In-Charge (OIC) of investigations, crime scene management, evidence collection and processing, as well as documentation and preparation for trial. Like the Chief, the Detective / Lieutenant is considered on call 24 hours a day for consultation and if needed on an active scene. Currently, the department has two officers trained as investigators and three who are certified as evidence technicians. Special Operations is also responsible for additional areas such as: LEIN Terminal Agency Compliance (FBI and MSP requirements) operations, Local Agency Security Officer (LASO), computer network administrator, the integration of new technology, developing and streamlining procedures to assist the road patrol units, CLEMIS (records) database, Live Scan (fingerprint database), Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests received by the Department.

### **Public Safety Clerks**

In 2024, 4 part-time civilian Clerks aid the Public Safety Department. These Clerks typically work 7am – 11pm Sunday through Saturday. Their responsibilities vary based upon the Public Safety Departments needs on that day. Routinely the Clerks provide exceptional customer service, assisting citizens who approach the public safety desk seeking help and information. Additional customer service when answering the telephone and directing these callers to the right city department. Additional responsibilities include processing city permits, distribute park passes, managing the house watch program, address FOIA request, release vehicle impounds, license dogs and cats, just to mention a “few.”

**Part I Crimes**, as defined by the Federal Bureau of Investigations, includes the most serious criminal offenses including murder, robbery, burglary, auto theft, and other serious victimization crimes. 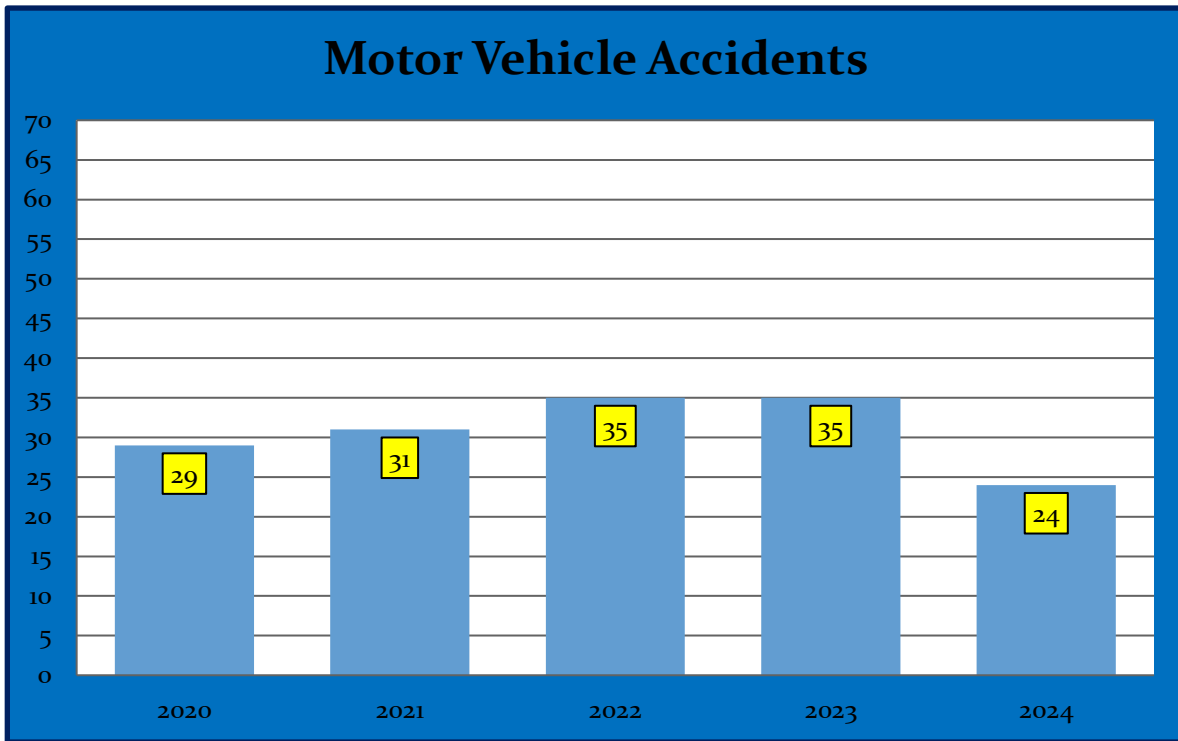

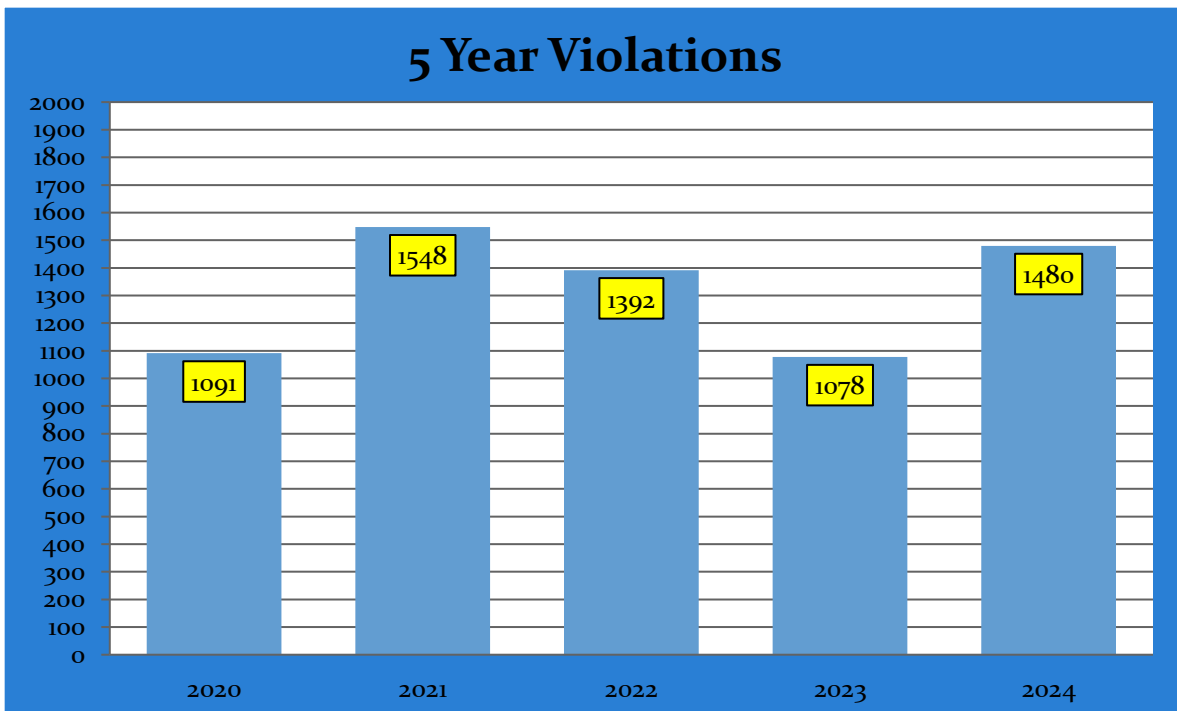

Eastern Wayne County Special Response Team

**Eastern Wayne County Special Response Team 2024 Incident Summary**

**02/14/2024** Ashland St, Detroit – Search Warrant for Armed Carjacking Suspects.

Two suspects wanted in connection with an armed carjacking and another attempt in Grosse Pointe Park. One suspect had made social media statements that he was willing to shoot police. One suspect was apprehended at the scene, and another was located later that day based on information acquired during the primary search warrant execution by EWC-SRT & GPP Detectives.

**02/18/2024** Cadieux Rd, Detroit – GPF Arrest of Robbery Armed Suspect.

A Suspect was wanted in connection with an armed robbery that occurred a few days prior in GPF. Information was learned that the suspect was squatting inside a vacant Detroit home on Cadieux. The property owner signed a waiver authorizing EWC-SRT to check the house. The suspect was located inside after the front door was breached. The weapon involved was recovered.

**02/27/2024** Chopin St., Detroit – Suspect wanted in multiple home invasions throughout the GP's.

GPC & GPW detectives requested SRT for the arrest of a 44-year-old suspect wanted in numerous home invasions throughout the Grosse Pointe area. SRT conducted this warrant smoothly and efficiently. The suspect with a lengthy criminal history was taken into custody at his home without incident.

**03/15/2024** Fairport St., Detroit – Suspect wanted for Animal Abuse

EWC-SRT was requested by the Wayne County Prosecutors Office Investigations Division to assist with locating and arresting a 25-year-old wanted for animal abuse & possible weapons. Detroit SRT was already activated on a separate incident and was unavailable. The suspect had previously posted videos online of him abusing dogs & puppies in addition to holding dog fighting events. EWC-SRT and agents of the prosecutor's office conducted the warrant at the suspect's residence. The suspect was not home. However, several sick and un-nourished puppies & dogs were located and taken from the residence by animal control.



**06-05-2024** Woodcrest St., Harper Woods – Auto Theft Suspect

HWPDP Detectives utilized EWC-SRT to execute a search/arrest warrant for a 19-year-old suspect wanted for numerous vehicle thefts utilizing a pro-pad reprogramming device. Previous threats of harming the police justified the utilization of EWC-SRT. The front door was breached after several announcements went unanswered. The suspect was located inside and arrested without incident. Four other minors were located inside. One child had a broken left arm that was improperly treated. The arm was infectious, and medical attention was sought. Child Protective Services was contacted and requested to investigate.

**08/24/2024** Woodlawn St., Harper Woods – Suicidal male with a long gun.

Information was learned that a 57-year-old male armed with an unknown long gun was refusing to exit his residence. Harper Wood officers had established communication with him, but all efforts for him to exit his residence were unsuccessful. MRAP vehicle was positioned on the front lawn, and EWC-SRT's members gave commands to exit his home over the PA system. The suspect complied and exited the house, where he was taken into custody without incident.

**09/24/2024** Woodmont St., Harper Woods – Felony Warrant & Barricaded Subject w/ weapon.

A 33-year-old convicted felon known to have a weapon refused to exit his house upon command by HWPDP officers. EWC-SRT responded with the MRAP vehicle. CIT officers established communications with the distraught suspect, who demanded FBI presence. Communication was made with the local FBI by CIT via telephone. Just before tear gas was deployed, the suspect threw his weapon out a side window. After a lengthy standoff, the suspect exited his home but failed multiple requests to leave his Pitbull inside. The suspect was arrested on the driveway by SRT members. Unfortunately, the dog charged officers during this arrest process. The threat was terminated by an SRT member shooting the animal to cease the charge/attack.

**10/29/2024** South Dartmouth, Detroit – Joint Jurisdictions Search/Arrest Warrants for Auto Theft Group

EWC-SRT and several other SRT Teams conducted a multi-jurisdiction warrant sweep for an active auto theft group that had struck the GP area and other cities in eastern Wayne County. Our team was assigned to locate and arrest a 43-year-old wanted felon. Team members breached the door to the residence, and upon entry, the suspect was in the living room, where he was arrested without incident.



**11/29/2024** Holiday Parade. The team was utilized for security and crowd protection during the 2024 GP Holiday Parade. The MRAP vehicle was used as a forward blocking point. Team members, some in plain clothes, walked the parade route, blending in with the crowd.

**12-20-2024** Mansfield St., Detroit – Suspect wanted for a Breaking & Entering of a GPP business.

GPP Detectives identified a career felon wanted for breaking and entering a GPP restaurant/bar just a few days after the original incident. The front door of the Detroit home was breached, and an agitated suspect was taken into custody. After his arrest, the suspect unintentionally admitted to the crime while sitting in a patrol car. He was unaware that the patrol vehicle recording system was recording his statements.

- It should be noted that drone technology was used in most of the above incidents. This dramatically enhances team capabilities and reduces liability.

### EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES



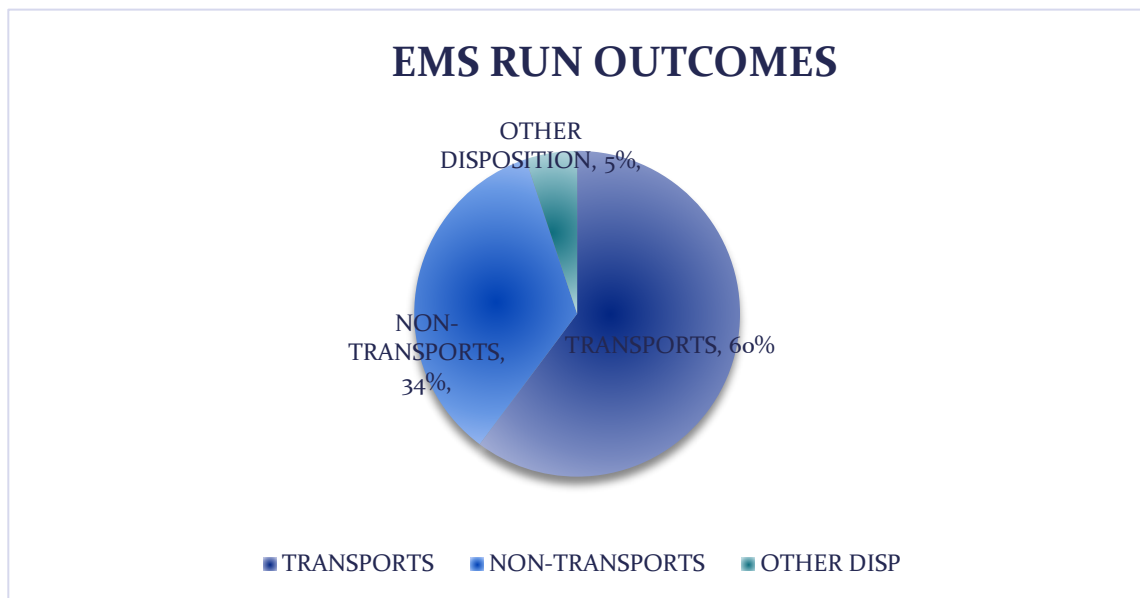
The EMS Division Instructor Coordinator is Sergeant Jason Cook, he is assisted by Sergeant Zef Bojaj and Public Safety Officer Paul Morang. All are licensed as Paramedic / Instructor Coordinators. Grosse Pointe Shores is a member of the Detroit East Medical Control Authority (DEMCA) and are governed by their protocols.

Having in-house instructor coordinators allows our medics the opportunity of continual training. This helps maintain the highest-level of pre-hospital care and intervention for sick and injured patients. As medical treatments are always evolving our Medics are expected to perform the latest on scene treatments once reserved for the hospital only, including administering medications and providing lifesaving procedures. Grosse Pointe Shores paramedics are licensed by the State of Michigan and Certified by the American Heart Association (AHA) to provide Advance Cardiac Life Support (ACLS). ACLS is the standard of care used by all healthcare providers for common cardiac emergencies. When seconds count, this level of care ensures the best outcome for our patients.



The National “Gold Standard” is to have an ALS unit to be on scene with-in 8 minutes, 90% of the time. Grosse Pointe Shores is pleased to report that in 2024 the average response time of our ambulance was 4.2 minutes. The average on scene time was 21.47 min/sec.

In 2024, out of 128 calls for service, 60% of all our EMS calls resulted in the treatment and transport of the patient to a medical facility.

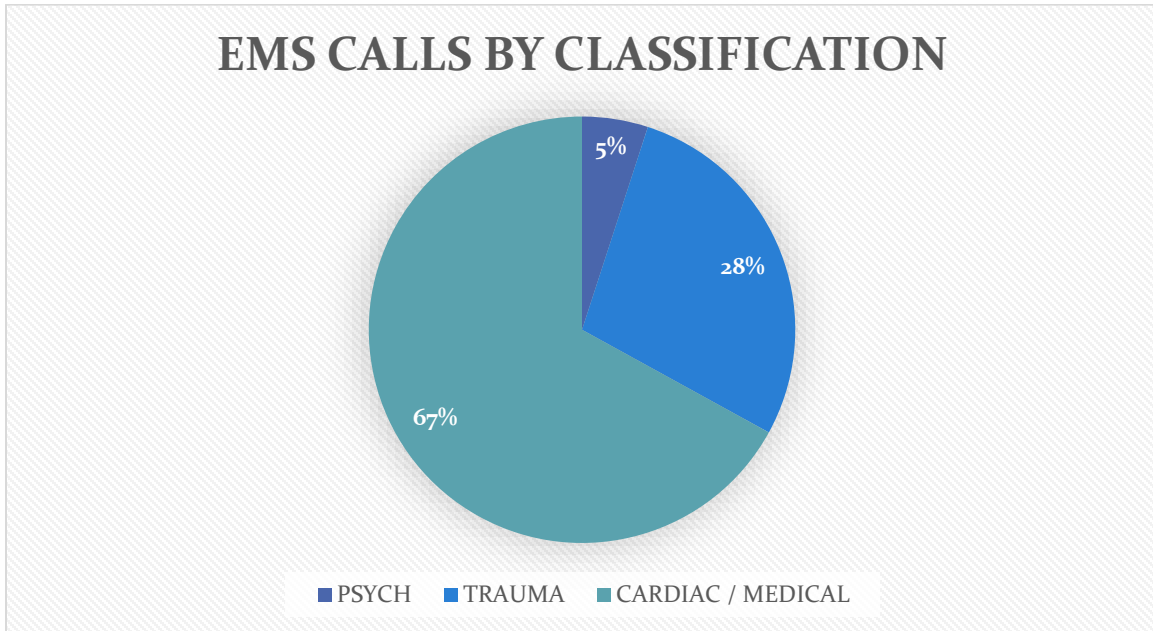

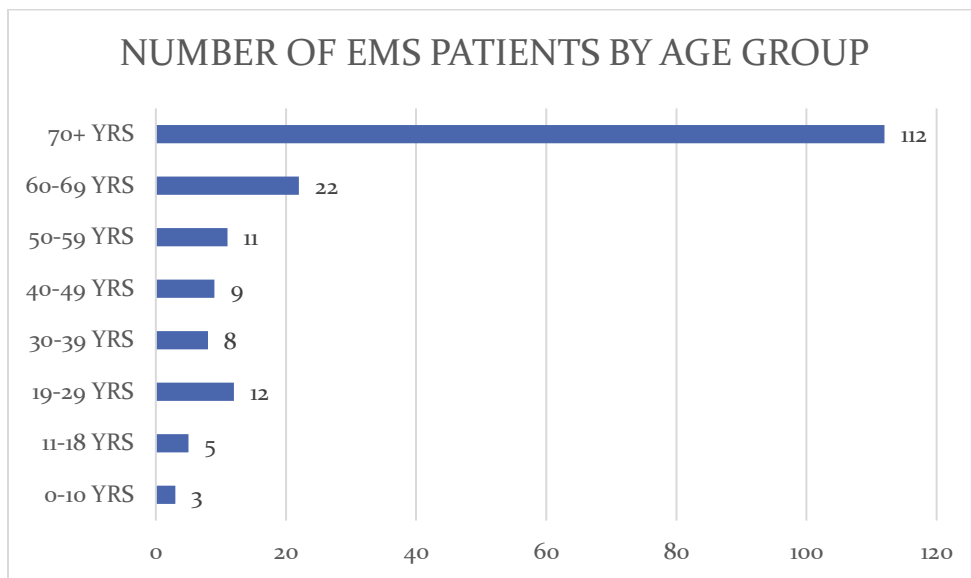

### FIRE DIVISION



On April 3, 1911, the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores was incorporated as a municipality by the State of Michigan. The city leaders hired Police Officers and cross trained them as Fire Fighters in what are referred to today as Public Safety Officers. In April of 1911 the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores bought their first pieces of fire equipment, purchasing a small hose cart and fire hose. Additionally, the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores had written agreements with the City of Detroit and Grosse Pointe Farms that allowed these neighboring communities to assist Grosse Pointe Shores with any confirmed working fire within the Village limits.

The Village of Grosse Pointe Shores Fire Division is overseen by Deputy Fire Chief Ron Coste. Deputy Chief Coste was hired in the year 2000 as a Public Safety Officer. Prior to Grosse Pointe Shores Coste worked as Fire Fighter for the Tri-City Fire Department and a Paramedic for American Medical Response ambulance company. Deputy Chief Coste responsibilities include the department's training agenda, apparatus, and equipment maintenance along with researching new fire equipment to purchase.

Today, the Village of Grosse Pointe Shores employ's 17 Public Safety Officers all crossed trained as Police Officers, Fire Fighters and Paramedics. The Village of Grosse Pointe Shores has two Fire Apparatus. The first, Attack 4 is a 2022 HME Mini-Pumper and the second, Engine 4 is a 1996 Emergency One Pumper. Both apparatuses can flow 1,500 gallons of water per minute. Additional equipment stored on Engine 4 and Attack 4 are ladders, roof saws, self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA) and the Hurst Tool (Jaws). The Village of Grosse Pointe Shores has Mutual Aid Agreements with the 4 Grosse Pointe municipalities and the City of Harper Woods to receive and render assistance during confirmed working fires.

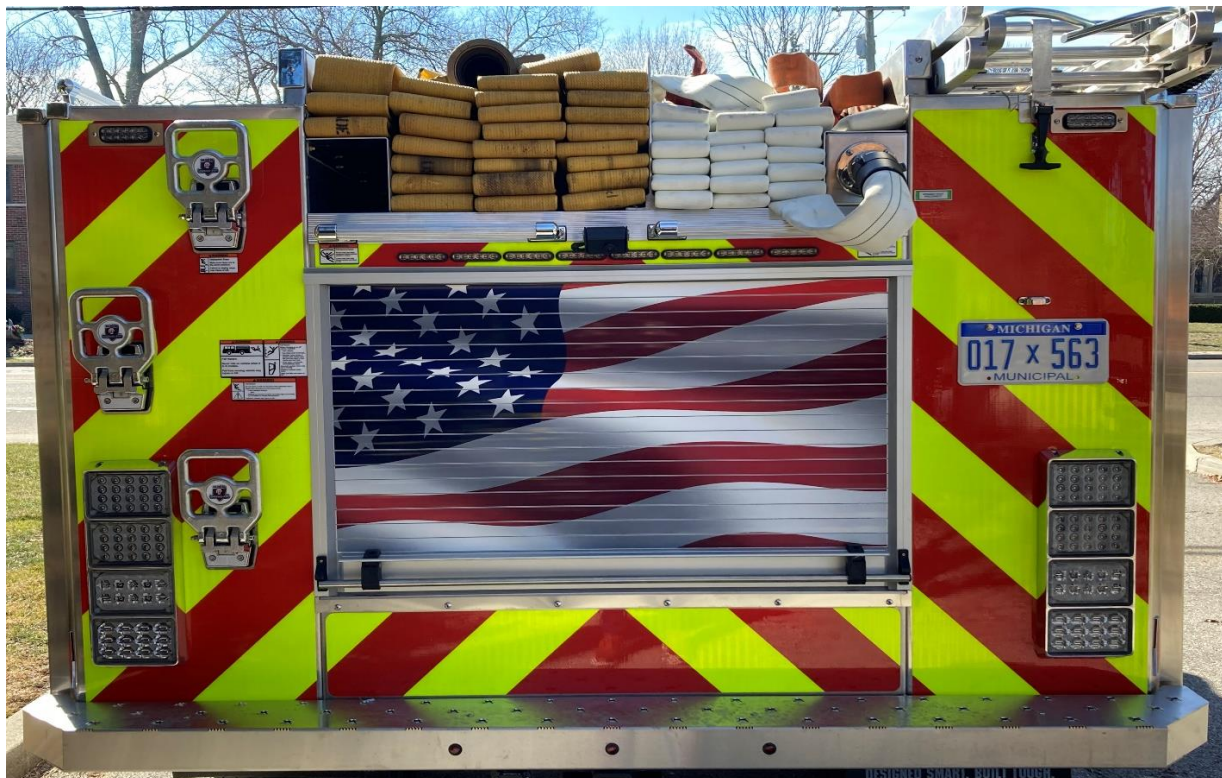

### **COST RECOVERY**

An essential ordinance that is enforced regularly in Grosse Pointe Shores is our cost recovery ordinance. Private contractors, commercial vehicles and motorists that cause damage to our infrastructure are invoiced for the cost of replacement and/or repair of any damage to the Village. Examples of this damaged property include police, fire or DPW vehicles, municipal buildings, power lines, streetlamps, trees, curbs, and fences. The Public Safety Department also recovers funds from each Operating While Intoxicated (OWI) arrest to cover the cost of processing and prosecution of these complaints. We have also added an administrative processing fee to all impounded vehicles. Throughout the year, the Department also provides supplemental public safety officer staffing to our commercial facilities and to various organizations requesting service within the Village. These facilities are invoiced for the services provided and we recover 100% of the cost of the officer's salaries, including benefits.

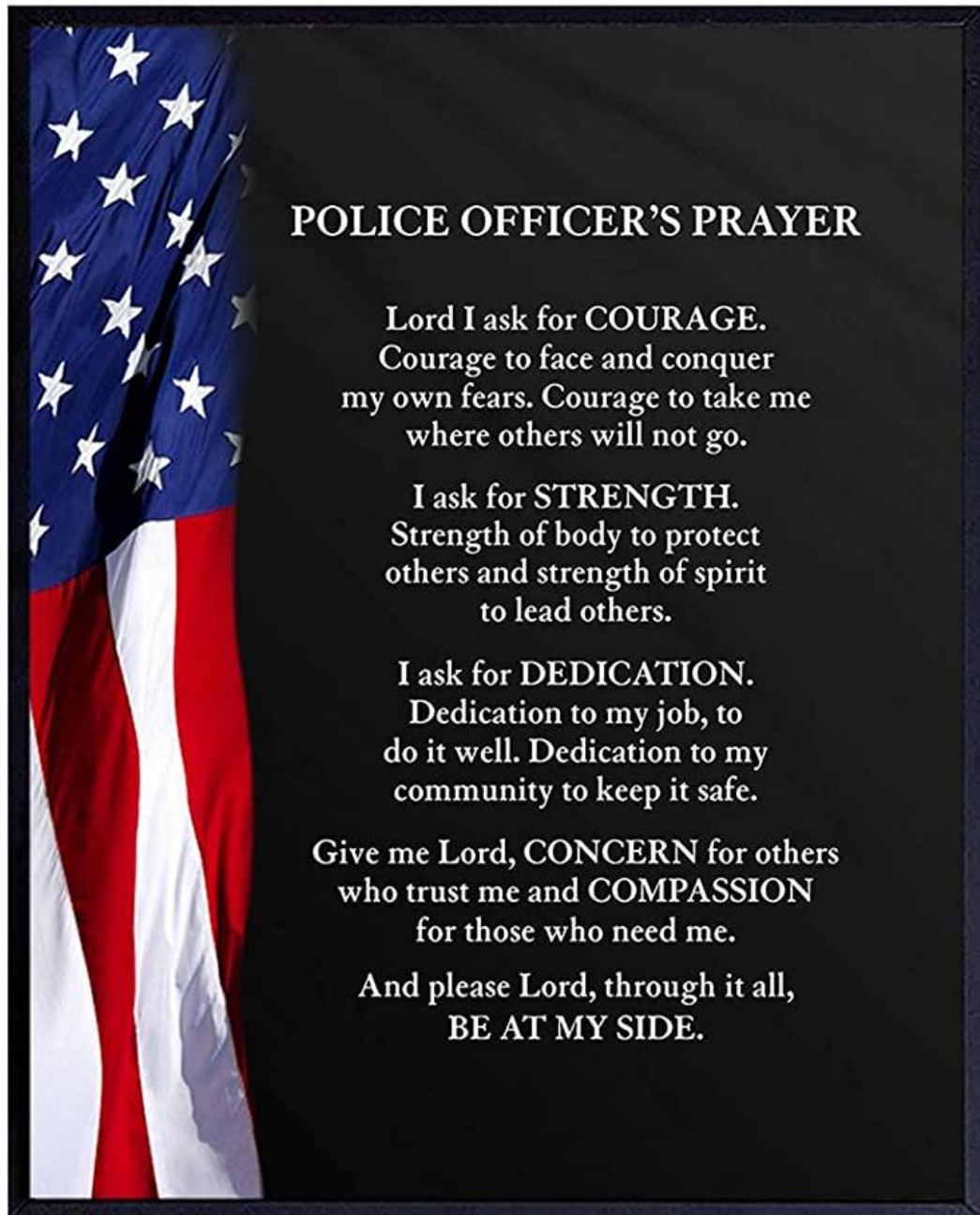
